1. What does it take to put together a musical at ABJ?

To put together a musical, it takes a lot of hard work and sacrifice to other aspects in your life. I think most of all it takes dedication to your character and perseverance in keeping your energy high and doing your best no matter what.

3. What is your favourite part of musical theatre?






PyeongChang 2018 Olympics By Madeleine Polak

SOUTH KOREA, Pyeongchang-- From February 9th to February 25th, 91 nations competed in the 23rd modern Winter Olympic Games in addition to the Olympic Athletes from Russia (OAR) who were not permitted to compete as a nation due to a suspension related to cheating in the previous two Olympics. 102 events in 15 sports were featured, making it the first Winter Olympics to have more than 100 medal events. The six new events added to the program included mixed doubles curling, mixed team alpine skiing and men's and ladies' big air snowboarding. Opening and closing ceremonies, along with the Paralympics, took place in the Pyeongchang Olympic Stadium (which cost over US\$100 million to build!) and were it's only intended use, therefore it is now scheduled for destruction. All of the Team Canada athletes performed exceptionally. The canadian ice dancers Tessa Virtue and Scott Moir, who were the opening ceremonies flag bearers, were no exception, breaking their previous world record in the short dance bringing home a gold medal. In the end, Canada came in 3rd place after Norway and Germany with 11 gold, 8 silver, and 10 bronze medals leading to a grand total of 29, three more than their previous record of 26. Go Canada go!


Did you know that Easter is the oldest of all the Christian holidays? But that's not all the facts I have for you, ABJ! This article is going to give you more knowledge on how Easter has developed through the years.

There is evidence that early Christians actually celebrated Easter every single Sunday. That's right. But that ended pretty quickly after because by the first or second century, it became only an annual affair, as it is today. It is also noticed that many of the traditions have been carried over from the Jewish celebration of Passover.

Christians in Syria and Mesopotamia had their festivals the Sunday after Passover, but those in the Alexandria region held it on the Sunday after the Spring Equinox.

Japanese Exchange Information

Purpose:

This short-term reciprocal student exchange program is designed to give Alberta students an opportunity to learn more about Japan and its culture and to give Japanese students a similar opportunity to learn about Canada.

Objectives:

To enable high school students to experience family and school life in another country - To establish international contacts - To develop an understanding of another culture - To promote international understanding

Yamate Gakuin:

Yamate is a private co-educational school located in Yokohama, Japan. The school, which was founded in 1966, provides a liberal education emphasizing responsible participation in community and international affairs. An international excursion is an integral part of the school's educational program and is compulsory for all Grade 11 students. Field trips to the United States and Canada and the return visits from American and Canadian students have been prominent events for the school for the past 36 years. Exchange Program Each April, approximately 160 Yamate students come to Alberta for two weeks. During this period they are billeted with Alberta families and attend classes in their host school, tour local attractions, attend social functions, spend family time with their host families, etc. In July, Alberta students pay a return visit to Japan and stay with Japanese families. Yamate Gakuin organizes some special day tours for the visiting students. Priority to travel to Japan goes first to students who billet Japanese students. The only costs to the Alberta student are airfare, ground transportation, insurance and spending money. Any hosting student from a hosting school may apply for the return visit, but, if some extra spaces are available, other students from those hosting schools can apply. Should you wish to be involved in this program and can billet Japanese students, but are unable to travel to Japan, this would still be a wonderful experience.

In the 2018-2019 school year, the Yamate students will exchange with the Edmonton & Area Schools (a three year cycle – Edmonton, Calgary, Red Deer). There will be 8 Edmonton – Area schools involved this year: Archbishop Jordan, John Paul II (St. Andre Bessette), Salisbury Composite, Jasper Place, Strathcona Composite, Louis St. Laurent, Sturgeon Composite and St. Peter the Apostle (Spruce Grove). Approximately 160 Yamate students will arrive Friday April 12 in Edmonton to stay 2 weeks until Friday April 26, 2019 with their Edmonton area hosts. In July 2019, all schools participating in hosting will send students to Yokohama, Japan for 2 weeks on the reciprocal exchange. The chaperones will be from the participating schools.
